



Charlotte Fire/City Issues Remain Unresolved

Emotions ran high in a packed house at Charlotte City Hall for the March 28 special meeting. The meeting was called after the resignation of 23 volunteer firefighters and their chief was given a week ago, leaving the city protected by a small staff of full-time firefighters and mutual aid assistance, if available, from neighboring fire departments.

The intention of the meeting was to give the public the opportunity to address the council and staff with their thoughts and

The volunteers and the public wanted to see the volunteers hired back by the city at the meeting.

Charlotte City Attorney Thomas M. Hitch opened the meeting with an explanation of the relationship between the city manager and the council

"We are constrained by the Home Rule City Act and the City Charter," Hitch explained. "Council cannot dictate what the City Manager can or can't do and cannot interfere with the city manager in her conduct of duties regarding the appointment of employees.

"Understand first that council members have no say in this matter," explained Hitch. "The power is between the fire chief and the city manager. The council does not have the power to negotiate. I'm disappointed that the chief is not here.

Fire Chief Robert Vogel's last day with the City is April 4. He was hired in October of 2021.

Mayor Michael Armitage explained that there could not be any back-and-forth dialogue between the Council and the speakers, a standard rule in governmental meetings.

"It's not appropriate for the council to deal with questions and answers or negotiate in a meeting," Attorney Hitch said in agreement.

Representing the fire department, former volunteer Ron Smith gave a list of reasons why the group resigned en masse. Some of the reasons involved incidents from several years ago and most involved Charlotte Mayor Michael Armitage.

A proposed upgrade in the emergency radio system several years ago with Eaton County 911, which the firefighters did not want was part of the problem, he said. The mayor's questioning of overtime pay and expenses was resented by the department. The volunteers took offense to the mayor's questions regarding a personal post on Facebook from a fire volunteer which he felt was not in good taste. An incident with Armitage's wife with an unknown, out-of-town fire volunteer in a parking lot left them feeling that he was overstepping his position. The entire city government budget "put on the back of the fire department" when the council discovered a major budget deficit for the city was another issue that the volunteers resented. Problems with

the Rural Fire Association (RFA) also played into the situation.

Why does the mayor have anything to say with the day-today operations of the Charlotte Fire Department?" Smith asked.

On March 21, Chief Robert Vogel resigned, Smith stated, due to city and RFA politics and some personal issues. "It was impossible for him to stay," Smith added. Smith referred to Vogel as a "unicorn" for CFD with the improvements he made and the grants he found for new equipment.

Smith added that for the firefighters to return to work, they would like an apology. He promised that this situation would never happen again and that they would find new ways to work with City Council.

Members of the public addressed the council with their thoughts and feelings, most stressing their appreciation for what the volunteers do, the value of the department, and the importance of a timely resolution to the situation. Several asked for the resignation of the mayor. Some added that they felt unsafe in their own town.

A letter of support was read from Jessica Droscha, who recently lost her husband in a fire. "We've lost sight of the heroes. We need to build trust and respect for our first responders," her letter stated.

City Council members, most visibly shaken, were allowed to comment at the end of the meet-

Councilmember Anthony Rodriguez felt that the mayor needed to be able to speak in response to the allegations made against him. He was concerned that the current situation could "allow innocents to die over the sins of one." "You're also welcome to get rid of me as well, but I hope you don't," he added.

Councilmember Horvath asked for the immediate resignation of the city manager and the mayor.

Councilmember Tammy Weissenborn told the group that all reports from the fire chief had been positive up to that point and that she had no idea of the cause of the walkout. "I feel safe with you on the job. Grievances are fixable and not worthy of walking out. You left the community feeling vulnerable and open to disaster." Her comments at the previous meeting regarding a community development were an attempt to find the positive and were not meant to be disrespectful, she explained.

Councilmember Brandon Dyer felt a resolution needed to be obtained, and direction provided to the city manager on how to proceed towards that resolution. "A resolution is needed to ensure the safety of the city going forward.'

Councilmember Christopher Lake met with the volunteers last week, after being shocked by their resignation. "I understand their hardship, but I am concerned for my family and the citizens' safety."

Mayor Armitage expressed his deep level of frustration, likening the situation to a game of "telephone." "I thought these incidents were behind us.'

"I will always try to do better," he added. "I am not perfect."

City Manager Erin LaPere felt blind-sided by the walkout, she said. "I knew there were some issues, but the chief never gave the impression that the department's morale issues were so

"They are fixable problems," she said. "We need a commitment from each other that we're not going to give up."

The meeting ended with no resolution. The city manager will work towards a resolution over the next week, she said. The next council meeting is scheduled for April 4, 2022, at 7 p.m.





Vhy Recycle?

As spring approaches and people begin to get outside in the fresh air, what a perfect time to reflect on how we are taking care of our environment. Of all the ways to do our part, recycling is one of the simplest and easiest things you can do. Over time, the world has gone through many changes in terms of how things are being produced. We are now in an era where things like diapers, individually packaged food and other disposable items are commonplace, which means we are creating more garbage now than ever before. According to Stanford University, the average American discards seven and a half pounds of garbage every single day. By choosing to recycle certain items, less garbage will end up in landfills, thus reducing the strain on our landfills and our resources, as well as creating less air and water pollution. Although recycling as a whole is trending upwards, there is still so much more we can do. A recent national study found Michigan to have one of the top recycling rates at 48%, but according to Quinn Underwood, director of the Charlotte Area Recycling Authority, "Considering we are a

Great Lakes state, it would be

wonderful to see a much higher number." Quinn says, "A lower number would indicate a lack of public awareness as well as a lack of convenient access to recycling. At CARA we are trying to change this by promoting as much public awareness as possible.

So, how can we help? I am a firm believer that every little bit helps and that everyone has the power to make a difference. Making a difference starts with you and it starts at home. If you have regular trash service, consider reaching out to your trash company and ask if they offer curbside recycling. For a small additional fee, certain areas are eligible to have their recycling picked up right from their driveway. For the rest of us, Eaton County is home to six local recycling centers, located in Olivet, Charlotte, Delta Township, Eaton Rapids, Grand Ledge and Sunfield.

All of these centers are free to use and you can find hours, locations, and lists of accepted items by visiting eatoncounty.

Something else to keep in mind when recycling items is to pay close attention to what can be recycled and what cannot. Both recycling centers and curbside recycling services will provide specific lists of recyclable items. By following these provided guidelines, we can keep recycling free of contamination, thus reducing the risk that any of those materials will end up back in landfills. One benefit to staffed recycling centers, such as CARA, is their ability to sort through materials as they come in, therefore being able to keep contamination rates extremely low. For more unique items that are not specifically accepted at local centers, such as hazardous wastes,







Dimes Brews for Ukraine

The recent invasion of Ukraine by Russia has inspired beer brewers from around the world to help by doing what they do best-make beer. Dimes Brewhouse in Dimondale is one of those that have stepped up to help Ukrainian relief efforts and is brewing "Red Eyes," a mildly hoppy American red beer. A portion of the beer sales will go to relief efforts in Ukraine.

"It's a smooth drinking, somewhat hoppy, classic amber-hued ale," said Dimes owner Chad Rogers.

"It started in one of my Facebook international brewing groups," explained Rogers. "We were hesitant initially, concerned about the validity of the efforts. A GoFundMe account was started, which solved the problem of how to contribute and be sure that the money went to where it was supposed to."

"This gives people a chance to help through us," Rogers added. Donations will be used for humanitarian relief and a food mission in Ukraine.

Pravda Brewery, located in Lviv, offered five of its recipes and artwork to the world's craft brewers, hoping that those who make and sell the Ukrainian beer would then donate to their relief efforts.

The March 10 invasion

of Ukraine by Russia has resulted in the death of 10,000 people and \$100 billion in property damage, according to the news agency Reuters.

Alcohol and brewing are forbidden in Ukraine now.

"But brewing, like giving birth or a marriage, is hope," the brewery wrote. "Beer takes several weeks to be ready. We hope we win by then.'

Nick Mulder and Nick Holbrook, assistant brewers at Dimes, started the process last week using a basic recipe, Rogers explained, with ingredients they readily had on hand. Two-row barley, malted oats, dark crystal malts, and some Michigan hops were used, allowing for a quick turnaround in making the brew.

The "Red Eyes" American Ale will be available for a limited time only, starting April 15. Dimes cans its own beer using a single head canner, along with designing and printing its own labels.

"Right now, we have the most diverse beer selection we've ever had," Rogers said. "We are hitting our stride in production and optimizing our production schedule." There are usually 12 beers on tap at Dimes, in a broad range of styles, in addition to flavored seltzers, kombucha, wine, and ciders.

"We hope what we are doing will bring people out to donate," Rogers said.
"There are 2,000 people who live in Dimondale.

"We are not being prescriptive about how much you donate," the Pravda brewers wrote online, "but the people of Ukraine need you to be generous."

Dimes opened in 2018, and the business continues to grow. A kitchen was added in 2020 and food is on the menu. A back patio, perfect for summer nights, has also been added. Artwork from local artists and open mike nights are scheduled. A summer solstice party is scheduled for June 24, live music will be available after the annual car show on June 17, and lots of musical acts are planned for the summer.





Locals Help Bald Eagles

Chris and Tammarie Arsulwicz were thrilled to see a pair of Bald Eagles nesting near their home near Murray Lake in Lowell, Michigan. For several months their neighborhood has delighted in observing the birds mating, nest building, and both birds taking turns sitting on their eggs. It was just a matter of time, they believed, before they would experience the thrill of watching the eggs hatch and the parents caring for their fledg-

Things changed last weekend, however. Neighbors noticed that the female bird was sitting on the ground under its nest. They had never seen the bird do this. The bird started having what was later determined to be seizures. They were able to wrap the bird in a blanket, as it repeatedly fell over and struggled to breathe.

Not knowing what to do, Arsulwicz contacted the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The hope was to get the bird, which they named Liberty, to a specialized veterinarian who could help the bird. A phone call to Blandford Nature Center in Grand Rapids was made, and they instructed her on how to transport the bird in a dog crate to the DNR. The neighbors worked together to accomplish this, with the bird being cooperative and not aggressive towards them. Liberty was very sick, they feared.

Sadly, the bird died within minutes of arriving at the vet. She was determined to be a five-year-old female, based on the band on her leg

That just left Justice, the male bird, to incubate the eggs, which is difficult for just one bird. They contacted Louise Sagaert at Wildside Animal Rehabilitation in Eaton Rapids, hoping to find a way to save these motherless eggs. Wildside rehabilitates native Michigan wildlife and returns them back to their homes.

Erik Lauchié from Carbon Stories, a media company in Grand Rapids, sent a drone up to capture footage of the nest to determine if eggs were actually present in the nest. They were unable to make a determination from the footage, but the wildlife teams present believed that the bird's behavior and stance indicated that there were eggs present.

Bald eagles are protected by the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act. Moving the eggs requires a special permit from the United States Department of Fisheries and Wildlife. The biologists who make that determination refused to issue a permit, Sagaert said and felt that nature should be allowed to take its course. So, the group wanted to help Justice continue his parent-

ing.
"It's very important to make sure that the male eagle has easy access to food," Sagaert told the group. "The

tion and Education Center volunteers, and Tree Monkey Tree Trimming and Removal built and mounted a feeding platform to allow Justice easy access to food. The nest is about 84 feet up in a tree. Tree Monkey, a tree trimming service owned by Joshua Wruble in Charlotte, used their bucket truck to lift the feeding platform up into the tree near the nest. Tree Monkey donated their services, making the drive from Charlotte to Murray Lake with their truck.

Every other day Chris Arsulwicz climbs a ladder to feed the bird fresh fish, including salmon and trout, on the platform. Justice has been joined at the nest by two juvenile birds. One of the young birds appears to be taking turns in sitting on

the eggs.

Sagaert was able to test Liberty for lead poisoning and found no evidence of that. The bird will be tested for other possible causes of death, including bird flu. Bird/Avian flu is a big concern; if Liberty had it, so will Justice. So far, he seems healthy, Arsulwicz said, and continues to act "normal."

"We are awaiting necropsy results to find out what caused Liberty's death," Sagaert said. "We are not sure at this point."

"The community came together to make this happen," said Arsulwicz. "We will continue monitoring the nest and keep our hopes up that we will have a happy ending."

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Scammers – Watch Out

Dear Andy,

It is happening again. People are calling to verify information to send the insurance company refund of \$400 per vehicle. They explained that due to so many refunds, they have hired independent callers to be in compliance to get the money back to people by the April deadline. They asked questions like my name, address, how many vehicles, what kind of vehicle and how many drivers of your vehicle. After getting my personal information, they asked if I would like it to choose a quick method for reimbursement...direct deposit into your account. That is when I hung up and knew it was a SCAM. Please warn your readers. Insurance companies are not calling or doing a direct deposit. Your refund will be a check addressed to you and mailed from your insurance carrier. Celeste B.

Dear Celeste,

Thank you for the heads Unfortunately, telephone fraud occurs every day. I have given this advice previously but here it is again...

If you do not know the person or you did not call them, you should never give personal information or confirm information to a stranger on the computer or the telephone. You must be absolutely sure, even if they claim to know your information. Online and telephone scams can look and sound legitimate.

I just got a call last week to give me a refund for \$299.99 telling me I bought a computer protection plan on March 22, 2019. I might not remember since it was so long ago, but if I followed the instructions so they could access my com-



puter, he would remove the program. He also claimed "the program was installed on my computer illegally and they are no longer allowed to conduct business in the U.S." I took his number, then called my credit union and they verified that I made no such purchase. I called him back...no such number...

Some online warning signs include the gift card offered by collecting data or having you take a survey. Professional looking sites can trick you into sharing a lot of personal information. If you are making a purchase or paying a bill online make sure you are on the official site. Also, be careful when you are told it is "Free" to enter and then they want your credit card number...it is NOT free. Scammers on the telephone, easily obtain private information by asking you to donate to what sounds like a good cause by appealing to your giving nature. Take their information. Do not share your information!

Watch out when the caller is giving you a deadline, such as "Last day" for this "Great low price" or a "One-time offer only." Hang up! Do not be bullied or talked into something with their "threats." When they sound professional with an urgent tone of voice, tell them you will call them back. If you continue to receive persistent calls, number. If you cannot figure it out, call your phone company or ask someone from a younger generation; they seem to know how to do everything on the cell phone and the computer.

Deleting and hanging up is okay. It's not rude...but it is rude and a crime when someone hacks your information and goes on a cruise or buys a new refrigerator with your credit card. If you are paying medical bills on a payment plan, many collection/payment companies are now using only

routing and account numbers instead of your debit card number. Still, do not give out your information. Call them back on the phone number you have on your invoice or bill.

More and more individuals are shopping online. Make sure you are on a legitimate site when you order your items. I know this is a lot of information but it is worth taking note to protect yourself financially and emotionally.


a little something for everyone.

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



City Manager Seeks Best Path Forward

At the March 21, 2022 City Council meeting the volunteer members of the Charlotte Fire Department made the announcement that all the members were resigning from their positions with the city. In the past week, City officials have met with members of the volunteer division to understand their reasons for leaving, and also held a public meeting on Monday, March 28, 2022 to provide a public forum to address those reasons and provide the opportunity for public input. Given the community-wide impact this decision had, I felt it was important to listen to the community as part of my process for analyzing the best path forward.

As the City Manager, I am charged with conducting my duties in a fair and impartial way, using my professional judgment to make decisions in the best interests of the city as a whole. I have conferred with the City's Labor Attorney regarding state and federal employment laws, along with reviewing the city's charter, ordinances, and other personnel and departmental policies. Based on all the information available and the discussion with the City's legal counsel, the determination is that the city cannot re-hire the volunteers as a group.

At this time we are announcing that we are actively and aggressively conducting recruitment for volunteers.

unteers have indicated that they wish to return to duty. The City strongly encourages those who wish to return to apply. It is our desire to retain as many of our former volunteer firefighters as possible.

I cannot express enough gratitude to our six full time firefighters who have shouldered the burden of emergency response during this time. Having sufficient emergency protection is our top priority and accordingly, we expect to fill these positions in short order. We will be reviewing applications on an ongoing basis beginning immediately.

In order to be eligible for employment as a volunteer firefighter, the applicant must complete an application, have earned a high school diploma or GED, pass screening of criminal background and drivers license record, and pass the drug screening and physical/ medical exam.

Remember When: Liberty Hicks-An Artisan in Stone

It's long gone, but years ago a unique stone house stood on the east side of Michigan Road, near the city limits. It was built from fieldstones of all shapes and sizes. Upon closer inspection, you might notice the addition of broken glass, bottles, light bulbs, and other sparkly objects embedded into the mortar. The house was built by Liberty Bell Hicks; he began construction on it when he was more than 70 years old. He began building his "castle," as it was known, gathering all the stones himself, and the sparkles were brought to him by school children. It took him six years to fin-

The house had short turrets at the corners, and each turret was topped with a lightbulb. It was situated on the north bank of the Grand

City directories have the address as both 812 and 848 Michigan Street, depending on which year you look. Benjamin Hicks, his son, was a contractor living at 790 Michigan Street. His grandson, William, lived at 773 Michigan.

Liberty Hicks was born

in March of 1839 in Ohio. He and his family traveled to Michigan in 1861 where they settled. He helped his parents build a small cabin just east of the city of Eaton Rapids. Later he moved to the Michigan Road property and lived there until he died.

He was a man who was known as a jack of all trades-and the master of many. He was good at anything he tried, it was said. He started out working as a baker's helper. His brother, Byron, was employed as a contractor and as a mason, so Liberty was encouraged to learn masonry. He excelled at it. Their father was a potter, so perhaps they inherited his talents with clay. Hicks specialized in stone fireplaces and stone foundation walls.

In 1861 Liberty and his brother Byron enlisted when the Civil War broke out. They joined Company G, 13th Michigan Infantry. With his previous baking experience, Liberty was assigned to the commissary as a private. An incident on the battlefield, however, left a drummer boy injured in battle and prompted Hicks to step up and seize the drum to inspire his comrades to victory as their new

drummer boy. He had been a member of a drum and fife corps in Ohio.

He served two terms in the Civil War and was honorably discharged. He then re-enlisted in Company G, the 8th Michigan Infantry, and served two more years. His pension documents say that he was disabled after

He returned home after the war. He married Georgiana ("Georgie") Matilda Sabin on October 11, 1867, in Eaton Rapids. They had nine children.

Hicks was a member of the Eaton Rapids James Brainerd Post #111 Grand Army of the Republic, and his wife was a member of

the Woman's Relief Corps (WRC).

His plans were to start a wholesale bakery business and built a bakery in Eaton Rapids. The bakery was destroyed by one of the many fires that the village suffered. Being somewhat astute when it came to business, however, Hicks saw this as the opportunity to help rebuild the city. He chose masonry to be his life's work and taught his

sons the trade, also. It was said that up until the last year of his life, at age 82, he never required the services of a doctor. Hicks died in 1921. Georgie died in 1934. Both are buried in Rosehill Cemetery.

I AM the Gate

In my sophomore year at MSU I found myself flying quite often. Many of my flights required that I had to find a connecting flight to get where I wanted to go. That was where the challenge was. It seemed like each time I had to get off one plane to board another, I found myself having to run for dear life to get to the correct gate I needed. As I ran, I remembered how my focus would zero in on this one objective of getting to that gate. In those moments it was the only place I wanted to get to because that was how I got to where I needed to be, through the gate. I would not be at peace until I went through that door.

Jesus explains that he is both Savior and Lord through multiple illustrations during his ministry. Appropriately enough, one such illustration is the GATE. In John 10:7-10 Jesus says, "Truly, truly I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who have come before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep have not listened to them. I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. They will come in and go out, and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."

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
